Required Text: Calculus: Early Transcendentals

About: MTH231 is an introduction to calculus of scalar functions of a single variable. The ideas are old and fruitful.

The book: As with other sections at CSI, we will use the book Calculus: Early Transcendentals; Fourth Edition, 2019; by Jon Rogawski, Colin Adams, and Robert Franzosa.

Syllabus: This class will follow the sequencing of the Department MTH 231 syllabus (<https://www.math.csi.cuny.edu/Courses/Syllabi/MTH231.pdf>).

Each day will typically cover 2 lessons.

Homework will be done through WeBWorK.

Homework: This course will use WeBWorK for online homework. The cost is right – free, but *occasionally* there are glitches with the grading. We will do examples during the lecture.

Quizzes: Most Mondays there will be a 20-minute quiz on the material from the previous week. No make-up quizzes will be provided. Your *lowest* quiz grade will be dropped.

Grading policy: Your grade will be determined by your performance on the mid-term, the final exam, the in-class quizzes, and the homework:

- HW: 10 percent
- Quizzes: 20 percent
- Mid-term exam: 35 percent
- Final exam: 35 percent
